### Father's Column

"Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

It is common that, after joining a new group, newcomers quickly take on the identity of that group they have joined; for example, the new little Scout wants to sleep in his uniform; the new recruit begins to use military slang; the new college student buys everything possible with the college logo. However the newbies quickly learn that belonging to a group implies long-term commitment, many demands, and resolution of differences. In this Gospel Jesus is talking about the commitment, demands, and resolution of differences that must occur in the Church that he is establishing.

Jesus has a realistic view of the community of believers he is founding. While he gives a blueprint for resolving differences, the more critical teaching he gives is that he is present to those who gather in his name, and it is his Presence that enables the resolution of conflicts, the unity of the community, and their growth in the Life he offers.

In a small parish, conflicts about how liturgy should be celebrated, how children should be formed in the faith, how the poor should be served, how the finances should be managed, how decisions are made, do occur. These can evolve into full-blown community-shattering and prayer-destroying objections when the people involved cannot get beyond themselves and their own narrow understanding of things, likes and dislikes, or agendas.

On the other hand, when time is taken for pious and consistent prayer, when Jesus is addressed as present in the midst of the community, when the good of all is put before personal preferences, then the unity of the community is preserved, rifts are reconciled, and the work of salvation moves forward.

## Year of the Eucharist Reflections

## Can we see and taste the changes of the bread and wine when they become the Body and Blood of Christ?

No.

The great theologian St. Thomas Aquinas explained that everything is made up of "substance" and "accident."

Substance is the core of the item, what makes it be that particular thing and nothing else. Accidents are the qualities of a particular thing.

So, for example, the substance of a stone is the essence that makes this particular object a stone as distinct from being a piece of wood. It is often intangible, nonphysical, immaterial, impalpable.

An accident, on the other hand, is a tangible quality that can vary. This particular stone looks blue and feels cold. "Blue" and "cold" are accidents.

At the Consecration, the substance of the bread and wine changes to be the Body and Blood of Jesus. The accidents of the bread and wine remain the same. In other words, it still looks like bread, it tastes like bread, it feels like bread, but it isn't bread any longer.

## A LETTER FROM OUR BISHOP

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Sudan's vast Diocese of El Obeid covers an area nearly one-third larger than the state of Texas. In light of the need for clergy and religious sisters and brothers to minister to Catholics spread out across the large area, the diocese prioritized vocations to the priesthood and consecrated religious life at its 2019 annual pastoral conference. The diocese entered into a partnership with the Diocese of Tombura-Yambio in South Sudan so that students from El Obeid could join a preliminary course in Yambio leading into their first year of seminary studies. With assistance from the Solidarity Fund for the Church in Africa, the Diocese of El Obeid recruited 15 new seminarians and four young women who entered the novitiate with the Congregation of Precious Blood Sisters in Nairobi, Kenya. Despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 lockdown in 2020, the seminary in Juba, South Sudan, reopened in 2021 with 35 seminarians from the Diocese of El Obeid. On August 15, 2021, one of the seminarian beneficiaries of the Solidarity Fund for the Church in Africa's grant to the diocese was ordained a deacon, and others will be able to continue their studies.

The Solidarity Fund for the Church in Africa has been making real differences in the lives of Catholics in Africa for more than 15 years through its support of seminary training, the formation of religious sisters and brothers, and other pastoral ministries that address the needs of the rapidly growing African Church.
