FATHER'S COLUMN

Jesus said: "I am the good shepherd.

A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

To be a disciple of Jesus is not simply to be a 'hired hand' who acts only to be paid, who is concerned only with his or her own welfare. Christ the Good Shepherd calls us to approach our lives, not with the limited, unfeeling, money-centered, self-interest of the hired hand, but with Jesus' sense of loving and compassionate concern for all men, women, and children. In embracing the christian attitude of humility and compassion for the sake of others, in 'laying down' our own lives for our brothers and sisters, we will one day 'take up' our lives again in the Father's Easter promise.

The Gospel of the Good Shepherd of this Sunday is a lesson in leadership that is centered in the way Jesus serves us. To act in the interest of those in our care, to freely place our own social status at the service of others, is to embrace the model of Christ the Good Shepherd.

Christ calls each one of us to realize that the gifts, the talents, and abilities that God has entrusted to us are not for our own selfish profit or for our own elevation. These gifts were given to us to help us fulfill our vocations as 'good shepherds': to seek out and bring back the lost, scattered, and forgotten; to enable people to move beyond their fears and doubts and realize their own gifts and talents; to bring the peace and justice of God into our own relationships and communities.

But the truth is that our lives are filled with noise and distractions and calamities that drown out the voice we desperately try to hear: the voice of calm, the voice of reason, the voice of assurance, the voice of unconditional and unqualified love. Such is the voice of Jesus the Good Shepherd who speaks to us in the quietness of our hearts, in the unqualified love of our family and friends, in the cries of those who call out to us in need. The grace we should ask for, is to hear the Easter Christ's voice of mercy, justice, and reconciliation amid the demanding and conflicting voices that shout at us every day of our lives.

FATHER'S Q & A

Correct answer from the last issue:

A. Asphyxiation

Explanation: The cause of death listed for a crucified man would be asphyxiation. Crucifixion involved the person being nailed or tied to a cross, which would restrict their ability to breathe properly. The position of the body and the weight of hanging from the arms would put pressure on the chest, making it difficult to inhale and exhale. Over time, this would lead to a lack of oxygen and ultimately result in asphyxiation.
