FATHER'S COLUMN

Jesus said to his disciples:
"I have come to set the earth on fire,
and how I wish it were already blazing!

Most people naturally avoid fighting. We want to live our lives in peace. We pray for peace in the world... But what is peace?

Jesus makes clear in the Gospel of this Sunday that his mission will bring serious divisions among people. The issue here is not to sow division, but to be faithful to the saving mission for which Jesus was sent. We have the deepest peace when we ourselves take up and are faithful to Jesus' saving mission. Even in the midst of strife, we can know peace

In this Gospel, Jesus uses the image of fire. This fire is an image referring to divine judgment. Jesus is clearly stating that he has come to judge the people. His own faithfulness to this task and his saving mission led to his great anguish and ultimately to his passion and death. So will we, his faithful disciples, be treated.

Jesus' intent here is not primarily to condemn people, but to challenge them to live right and according to the covenant established with God. So this must be our intention as well. Thus commitment to our Christian mission means facing opposition. The critical question for Jesus' disciples is whether or not we are enough on fire to continue his saving mission, no matter what the cost.

The important point is that neither Jesus nor we choose division and conflict; we choose to speak God's word and preach the values consistent with God's reign. Thus, divisions occur simply by being faithful to God's message. That's the power of the Gospel: being a faithful disciple of Jesus will often instigate a clash of values, of principles, of priorities. The judgment we ourselves must make each day is whether or not we are faithful to the Gospel values and challenges Jesus has taught us.

Jesus' very message leads to division because it calls people to conversion and a radical way of life, a life of self-giving for the good of others. We must make a decision to follow him and share his passion, to be self-giving as he is. This results in division, even within families, because all of us do not make the same choice to follow Jesus

Jesus came to preach the Good News of radical fidelity to God. However, being faithful to Jesus, even when this brings conflict and divisions, is how we achieve lasting peace. If we compromise our Gospel message in order to have peace now, we forfeit the everlasting peace which is promised to the faithful disciple. The choice is ours.
